- Eliminate pre-existing and pre-conceived barriers by cultivating trusting relationships among all stakeholders within the department, participating guest artists and the community
- Design, curate and implement meaningful performances and residencies based on the needs of the community space in which it is taking place; all activities seek to complement, not take away from the wonderful work that is already taking place in that specific community space
- Provide an impactful platform for music students and guest artists to engage in the practice of being a citizen artist
- Utilize often unexpected spaces for transformational musical experiences

Montgomery Place

Participants in the University of Chicago Chamber Music, Vocal Studies and Piano Program present 9 concerts annually at **Montgomery Place Engaged Living in Hyde Park.** These hour-long programs are presented to residents and their families on Saturday and Sunday afternoons and have become a favorite performance series for the Montgomery Place community to attend. The performances are always followed by a casual reception in which the performers mingle with the audience over refreshments. Performers enjoy getting to know the residents, as much as the residents enjoy getting to know them!

Visiting Artists-in-Residence

The Performance Program regularly hosts **Visiting Artists-in-Residence** to engage with our ensembles and programs. These residencies provide our musicians with the opportunity to engage repeatedly and meaningfully with accomplished professional artists. Artists workshop and perform with ensembles, visit music classes and engage with the surrounding Hyde Park community.

During the 2024-25 academic year, UChicago brought artists, Jorge Emmanuelli Náter to Hyde Park Neighborhood schools and violinist Will Hagen to present workshops at Kenwood Academy and the Chicago High School for the Arts.

The Performance Program also hosted four community music schools to bring their top string quartets to perform and receive feedback from Will Hagen in a masterclass setting in Fulton Recital Hall.

Don Michael Randel Ensemble-in-Residence

In 2013, the University of Chicago created a new program, supported by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, that would provide a permanent home for world-class musicians at the University of Chicago. Named for University of Chicago President Emeritus Don Randel, the residency program enables deep engagement between exceptional visiting musical ensembles and UChicago faculty, students and staff, as well as the surrounding Hyde Park community.

In 2024-25, the music department hosted progressive Bharatanatyam dance company, inDANCE as their 2024-25 Don Michael Randel Ensemble-in Residence. InDANCE interacted with youth in three separate settings: the Logan Center for the Arts Matinee Series, The UChicago Lab School Early Childhood Campus and through a partnership with UChicago Hillel in a Movement and Identity Workshop with Bronzeville Youth Identity Collaborative.

"If Music Be the Food..."

"If Music Be the Food..." is a series of benefit concerts which raise awareness and support for our neighbors in the local community who are experiencing food insecurity. Our mission also includes teaching music students about the importance of utilizing their artistic talents for the good of the community. Each concert is a fully grass-roots community event involving professionals, students, and local volunteers in joyful collaboration. We are striving to address nourishment in all its forms; our bodies require nourishment from food and our souls from music and community!

Founded in 2009 by violist Carol Rodland in Rochester, NY, IMBTF has become a national musicians' movement, with wonderful artists across the country creating projects based upon this idea in their own communities. The complete Shakespeare quote from Twelfth Night captures fully the IMBTF ethos: "If music be the food of love, play on!" Music, food, love...it is all here in what we are doing together with every "If Music Be the Food..." concert.

In April 2024, the University of Chicago Chamber Music Program partnered with the UIC Chamber Music Program to present a concert with this format at the First Unitarian Church of Chicago in Hyde Park. 15 University of Chicago students, 10 University of Illinois at Chicago students, 3 directors from both institutions and 1 staff member from the University of Chicago presented a beautiful program with all proceeds benefiting the Greater Chicago Food Depository.

Making Waves After-School Program

During the 2024-25 academic year the Music Department at the University of Chicago launched partnerships with two Hyde Park neighborhood schools: Bret Harte Elementary and Wadsworth STEM. UChicago Percussion Ensemble Director, John Corkill, facilitated weekly after school sessions over the period of eight weeks, culminating in a final informal performance for families and caregivers.

In each session of Making Waves, students engage with principles drawn from grade-level standards in engineering, math, and science, as well as best practices in music education. Students design, build, and analyze custom musical instruments and then compose and perform original works using those instruments.
